More Than a Pretty Face

Five keys to make your stallion stand out of the crowd. By Alannah Castro

Take a look through the glossy pages of any equine magazine and you'll see striking photographs highlighting stallions of all ages. In today's competitive market, however, it takes more than a pretty face to sell breedings. It takes intentional and strategic marketing moves to catapult your stallion out of the shadows and into the limelight.

The performance record of a show-ring veteran might speak

for itself, but when marketing a young or unproven stallion, there are a few important things to keep in mind. Employing these time-proven strategies will make your job as a stallion manager more successful when it comes to booking breeding's.

Start with a good product.

When looking at a stallion prospect, John Yarnelle, breeding manager and owner of Yarnelle Farms in Fort Wayne, Indiana, has a checklist of attributes on his wish list. Yarnelle Farms has been breeding Paints for 30 years, and they currently stand leading APHA stallions Special Invitation and CR Good Machine as well as Big Money Impulse and Guaranteed. "A stud has to have a pretty head. They've got to have excellent conformation and a big hip on them because people always want to upgrade their mares," John said. Meaghan

Gilmore of Bellingham,

Washington, is a partner on the 2011 bay overo stallion The Best Machine.

Because "Logan" was injured as a yearling, his stellar pedigree weighed heavily in his favor when his connections were deciding to promote him as a breeding stallion. Logan is by National Snaffle Bit Association Hall of Famer A Good Machine and out of Perfectly Zippo, a Zippos Sensation mare who has 12 Registers of Merit,



five Superiors and a Youth Versatility award.

"Paperwork is extremely important. Years ago, people would venture out more and try new stallions with foreign pedigrees because they liked the horse itself," Meaghan said. "These days people are much more conservative about their breeding choices, and they want to see good paperwork."

Deanna Williamson of Williamston, Michigan, puts similar weight on a

stallion's pedigree and conformation. In fact, it was a big factor in the decision to stand Never Compromise, a 2008 sorrel overo stallion, to the public.

"I went back and forth: Do I really want to be a

stud owner? Should I sell him?" Deanna said. "I really like how he's made, and I really like the Zippos Sensation and Vested Pine (QH) aspects of his pedigree. I didn't really decide to start actively promoting him until I had some babies on the ground, which was at the beginning of this year. We really liked how he crossed on our mares, and that's how it all started."

Invest in promotion.

Promoting a stallion is a multi-faceted endeavor, but there are a few staples on which John, Meaghan and Deanna agree.

"We took advantage of the *Paint Horse Journal* offer where you receive 25 percent off stallion advertise-

ments in November, December and February," John said. "People need to see your stallion in the magazines in the early months when they're sitting around at Christmas and New Year's. They're not breeding yet, but they're talking about it."

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More Than a Pretty Face

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Meaghan has found that high-quality photographs play a large part of marketing Logan since he is unable to show.

"We really had to gamble on getting enough conformation pictures so that people could see his beautiful balance and be able to visualize what they

were breeding to," Meaghan said. "You have to be willing to invest, especially with an injured stallion."

Social media is an important and ever-evolving way to get your stallion's name out to the general public, too.

"Social media is huge. That's where people are going to spend their time throughout the day, and you can post and repost ads, pictures of foals, discounts and take advantage of holidays," Meaghan said. "On social media, you can see an immediate response. 'How many people like this ad? How many people are making a suggestion to somebody else about this

stallion?' People can ask immediate questions."

Be creative and flexible.



When promoting a younger stallion that lacks a show record performance proven progeny, it's important to think of out-of-the-box ways to make him stand out in a sea of options. Last year, Deanna donated breedings to a stallion service auction—with a twist.

"If you bought a stallion service auction breeding, you got another breeding for free that you could use on any mare—even your friend's mare. We didn't put any restrictions on it,"



Deanna said. "That helped us get Quarter Horse people to breed him to their Quarter Horses. We were really excited because we had crossed the barrier."

For 2017, Deanna has rolled out another innovative breeding special to help pique

breeders' interest in her stallion: the stud fee is not due until the birth of a live foal with color; if the foal is solid, you'll get the breeding certificate for free, along with a free rebreed to Never Compromise.

"You're really going to believe in him if I say, 'You don't have to pay for a breeding until a colored foal hits the ground,' " Deanna said. "It's putting my money where my mouth is. I believe in him, and I want other people to believe in him." Meaghan utilizes the APHA World Championship Show and its Paintspecific audience to get her stallion's name in the public eye.

"Every year at the World Show, the partnership gives away a free breeding. We have a daily draw where we give out different logoed prizes based on The Best Machine, and then we give out a free breeding," Meaghan said. "We typically have a minimum of 100 names in the jar by the time we're done. When we get home, right around the holiday season we announce who won the breeding."

The free breeding winner announcement typically generates a lot of buzz on social media, Meaghan says, and they're able to book additional breedings from the publicity.



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Provide high-quality

customer service.

Once your stallion starts to gain notoriety, John emphasizes the importance of customer service and word-of-mouth to support your marketing campaign.

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"Customer service is huge as far as being

available for people and taking care of them," John said. "We actually take semen requests the same day as collection. We let people check their mares on Monday, call us before noon that day and we will get the semen collected that

afternoon, ship it out that night and get it to you the next morning, so it's fresher."

For mare owners who have limited ability to breed at home, Yarnelle Farms also offers premium mare care.

"We can cycle them, clean them and make sure they're good before breeding them," John said. "People bring mares to us because they don't

have the right veterinarians, or the cost of

shipping and getting their vets out is so much more expensive instead of them loading up and coming to the farm."

Be patient.

When it comes to stallions, long-term is the name of the game. For the Yarnelles' stallion Guaranteed, a

2010 bay homozygous tobiano stallion, the show ring was out of the question after he was injured as a weanling. Because he wasn't able to compete, they waited until his get were hitting the show pen to shift his marketing campaign into high gear.

"Because of our reputation, we were able to talk some people into breeding to him, and now we're starting to campaign him," John said. "He's got some 3-year-olds, and in 2017 it's going to be even



better. He'll start to get some numbers on the ground, and once he has that, I think we can start promoting some of his babies so people can see what he's produced as a sire."

Deanna stresses the importance of showing a stallion's get.

"If I'm expecting people to pay good money to breed to my stallion and show their horses to help me promote him, then I should do the same thing," Deanna said.

Meaghan has found that customers feel more comfortable with

choosing a younger stallion once they have 3-year-olds in the ring.

"People need to know that horses are producing user-friendly get. Amateurs want to know that they can buy something and be successful," Meaghan said. "People want some kind of insurance behind their purchases."

The End Game

Marketing a stallion is a timeconsuming and ever-changing job—one made even more complicated with a young, unproven sire—but success is a reward in itself.

"Success is high numbers, happy and return customers and improving the quality of the breed," Deanna said.



Successful business people who are in control of their life can feel like teenagers again, insecure and anxious, not because they are scared of the horse but because they are worried what other people think of them.

We start out falling in love when we find our special unicorn.

This horse seems to give us everything we ever dreamt about. We become children again, free, adventurous and empowered that we feel like we can do anything... until other people point out all the things that aren't quite right.

Like any other relationship, as long as we are in our bubble, on a deserted island or locked up in a wooden cabin deep in the woods and away from life, as we know it, love seems to be easy and bliss. But we all know that bliss does not last. Not because we don't deserve to be blissfully happy but because bliss is generally an escape from reality.

We all have had times where we tried to outrun our problems only to find that our problems could run faster and eventually came crashing down on us as soon as they caught up.

Problems can never be outrun; they have to be confronted head on!

So what does that have to do with our riding you might ask????

It has everything to do with that.

The passion for our horses and our sport gives us the fuel to keep going. We keep training, we keep learning and we keep going even after we fail, because quitting and living a non-horsey life is just not an option.

We all struggle and we all have demons to face. Let us be there for each other instead of judging one another. No matter who we are and where we are at in our riding, we all have dreams and we all have insecurities.

Let us create a horsey community were no one has to hide in a bubble, flee to an island or lock themselves into a cabin. Instead lets be supportive and see the rider through the eyes of the horse.

Instead of judging the book by the cover let us start reading the pages.

Instead of criticizing other riders let us get to know each other and offer help.

If you are an instructor, be encouraging and keep someone else's dreams alive.

If you are a friend, listen not to what is said but hear what is meant between the words.






Event Spotlight

Hunter Under Saddle & English Equitation

The hunter under saddle should be suitable to purpose. A hunter should move in a long, low frame and have the ability to increase its stride and cover ground with ease in a flowing movement. Those moving in an artificial frame with quick, short or choppy strides are not desirable. The hunter should have an interested expression and an alert eye. Hunters must be obedient and should willingly respond to cues of the rider. When asked to extend the trot or for a hand gallop, they should move forward strongly with appropriate forward impulsion. To obtain sufficient impulsion from the hindquarter, the poll should be level with or slightly above the withers. The face should either be on or slightly ahead of the vertical.







SCORE IT

With the 2019/2020 show season under way a lot of competitors will be filling out their points sheets and may not be fully aware of the way to complete the forms.

As an association we have some criteria that we need you as members to meet to ensure fairness and equity to all showing members. All • showing members or members who have a trainer showing for them must have a current financial membership with the Paint Horse Association. If you have shown or your horse has shown, and you are not financial at the time of the show you will not be eligible for points.

As of the 1st August 2019, the Association had a few minor rule changes that will impact our showing membership. The biggest one is the change to how you fill out your champion points. We have redeveloped the Official Results Form and new books are available for purchase from the office. If you currently have an old book, please do not stress we will still accept points submissions on these.

I have included a mock-up points sheet for everyone to see, this is used as a guide only and will vary from event to event. If you follow a few simple rules when completing your form, you really cannot go wrong.

Your points sheets must have the following:

- Your horses name and registration number
- Your name and member number
- Have a show official sign off on the claim as well as delete any unused lines on the form.
- A program attached. Don't stress if the event does not have a program there are a

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few options that we do accept; Draws/ Order of Events/Program etc are all acceptable.

- Your submissions must be received by the office within 14 days of the show date; we accept email & postal submissions.
- Please use separate sheets for Amateur/ Youth/Horse events (Amateur Owner Halter goes on the horse form)

By following these simple steps you can avoid paying penalty fees, these are outlined in the Paint Horse Association Rulebook under *Rule 219* & Available for download from our website.


